c. Defined as never married or cohabited, except in Jamaica where 'ever partnered' included women who ever had a 'visiting partners'.

d. Other reasons included: woman was not selected, refused, lacked privacy, or in Bolivia, did not have a partner in the past year.

e. Paraguay asked whether any daughter or son was in residence, but not whether each age eligible child was living in the household. Jamaica did not ask women whether they were living with a daughter or son but did include a response option for "no children".
